## How it works

- 1. Contact us! Our website is <a href="www.logancamp26.com">www.logancamp26.com</a> and has our camp commander's contact information. If your cannon is near another camp, we will refer you to their counterpart to complete the project.
- 2. We will come photograph and assess the monument or cannon.
- 3. Once we have seen it, we will plan a time to come out and start work. Outdoor work also depends on the weather.
- 4. Our repair process is simple- A) remove surface coating, B) Wash, C) Prime and paint or polish, and F) Rededicate officially using a Grand Army of the Republic format.
- 5. What we use: non-marring tools, heavy duty implement paint and elbow grease.
- 6. What it will cost you= \$0. We accept donations to help offset our cost, approximately \$100 per cannon, but do not require them. Donations of materials are also accepted.
